#### All children should be accessing learning


Please note that all children should be accessing learning either online or in-school and attendance is a government reportable requirement.

It's great to receive so much positivity regarding the online learning offer we are providing many children. The teaching online via Teams led by our teachers is significantly better and more teacher-led than our offer last March in the first Lockdown.

Well done to all our teachers! Like many of you have recognised, the teachers were able to switch to live lessons by 10:30 am the night after the government announcement last Monday. By Thursday last week, we switched to offer either live lessons online and a teacher in school to lead learning for children of critical workers.

This tweet from Year 2 Elm class sums up the experience of a quality online offer:




"Our online learners and our face-face learners are working so hard to follow the same lessons. From looking at your work, we can't tell who was working at home and who was not! What do you think?"



Reception children in uniform, ready to learn and joining in with Miss Hall.




Year 1 with Mr Rees were up and out of their seats learning some mindfulness techniques.

# Extending data for families to support home learning

The DfE has stated that many mobile networks have agreed to extend data packages for free for some families as detailed <u>https://get-help-with-</u> <u>tech.education.gov.uk/about-increasing-mobile-</u> <u>data</u> If families meet the criteria below, please contact us and we can support the application for increases in data allowances:

- do not have fixed broadband at home
- cannot afford additional data for their devices
- are experiencing disruption to their face-to
  - face education

### Childcare bubbles

Childcare bubbles are permitted so that two families can link to support each other with <u>remote</u> <u>learning</u> and childcare. This may be an option for some of you to enable your child to access learning alongside one other child. No adults can enter the other home.

## Part-time reduces the risk of COVID-19 spreading

We would like critical working parents to review that if they can keep their child at home for some days because they are part-time and access online learning, this supports the current urgency to suppress the virus spreading and safeguards our staff and families in the community.

Pre-school parents – Apply for a Reception school place for next year (2021-22) deadline this Friday 15th Pre-school parents should not miss the deadline of Friday 15<sup>th</sup> January to register your child for a school reception place for this September. If your child will be 4 years old after 31<sup>st</sup> August, parents will need to have applied for a school place at North Somerset Council's website <u>https://www.n-</u> somerset.gov.uk/my-services/schools-

<u>learning/school-admissions/applying-school-place</u> or <u>https://tinyurl.com/yynpj974</u> If you attend HVA Pre-school, you must apply on time, otherwise you will not secure a school place for your child.
