

Bring & label clothes

We will be making sure the children experience the various weather in our lives at playtimes and sometimes during lessons. It is often said that there is no such thing as bad weather, but the wrong clothing. Please ensure your child has a school jumper and coat for school every day.

When it rains, we do get puddles. If you want your child to bring wellies into school they can, and these can stay in school if necessary. Alternatively, because we have underfloor heating we cannot quickly dry socks, so there is no harm in packing a spare pair of socks in book bags, should they be needed. Please remember to label all clothes.

"I'd like to bring in..." Reminder

Every now and then again, we expect children to follow a trend and begin to bring things into school. Sometimes we can support these interests and sometimes we have to make decisions that mean we may 'ban' the items as it is causing too much distraction or disruption in a number of ways. Please can you ensure your child **does not** bring any of the following into school:

- Pokémon cards (except at Pokémon club on Wednesday's break/lunch in Mr Fraser's room)
- Match attack cards (football cards)
- Miniature skateboards (fingerboard)
- Permanent marker pens

If they are brought in, teaching adults may confiscate and return at the end of the school day.

Y4-6 Parents: Mobile Phones / watches

Some children bring a mobile to school so they can communicate to their parents that they have arrived at school or that they are leaving or have arrived home. If your child now has a mobile phone and they bring this into school, this needs to be handed to the Class Teacher for storage.

If children have digital watches that link to their phone, notifications for messages need to be switched off, otherwise they can distract and disrupt learning in the classroom.

Reading challenges

We are continuing with the reading challenges in school. With parental support to read daily, alongside other opportunities in school, children in our school are excellent readers.

Year 5 & 6 children can now sign for their own reading, but we strongly encourage parents to encourage listening as much as you are able. They are only young once!
